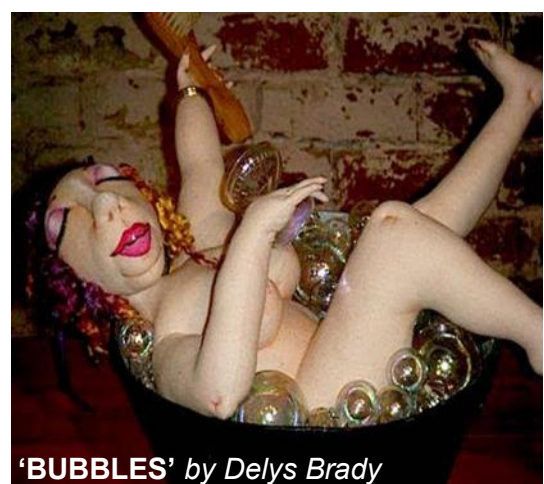

A member's perspective: "I joined Moore River Weight Watchers in October 2012 and graduated the following year. To me personally, being able to go to a group meeting each week and listen to how the other members have achieved their weight loss was fabulous encouragement.

Weight Watchers Federation is not like other weight loss groups where you must either buy food each week, and are compelled to attend measurement meetings etc, etc. We are there to discuss menu's, food tastings, labelling of food items and because we record our daily food intakes, lengthy discussions on different foods.

We aim to have a greater weight loss than weight gain each week and support each other along the way.

Internal club competitions are held where we challenge each other, ie as a weekly pinnacle challenge, or an Apple Tree Competition to see how long you can stay on the tree before a weight gain can drop you off. All of these competitions have a monetary reward at the completion.

I personally look to this group as a support group for not only weight loss but a group where one can go and discuss issues over a friendly cup of tea. Our small group has guest speakers, several outings per year and of course our Birthday Breakfast and Christmas Party. All of these form friendships over the years.

For me, if I didn't attend I would soon slip off the rails and revert back to unhealthy practices because I have an absolute craving of sweet things!! Don't most of us? By setting smart goals and education I can still have something nice each week. You don't have to cut out sugar, you can still have the occasional sweet treat as long as you don't over indulge".

The Bendigo Bank has kindly granted Sovereign Hill Community a Defibrillator and Safety Box for installation at Sovereign House. Of course, we are hoping that it never has to put to use but it is good to know that it is there should it be needed. Would you like to be trained on how to use the defibrillator? The more people that know how to use it the better for the community. Please let Dianne know asap on 9577-1430 if you want this training, it doesn't take long, the group training will be held at Sovereign House.



The Dept of Agriculture has asked us all to be aware of the Tomato Potato Psyllid; it has been noticed in the shire and will quickly invade our home gardens and the

growers if it is allowed to spread. Please see the article within this issue if you are unsure of what this little critter looks like.

The Shire of Gingin granted us some funds for playground equipment. We are aware that it has been a long time coming, but the company that was to supply has kept delaying delivery so it has been decided to go to another company for similar items. That has been actioned and we are now making progress, we are hopeful that items will be in before Easter, or very close to that.

The Association is looking at a shade structure for part of the playground, we are in the process of obtaining quotes and applying for grants for this year to fund this item.

We now have security cameras at Sovereign House, which hopefully will deter the ongoing vandalism which has been occurring, especially in the toilets. The cameras are running and recording 24/7; the records are kept for some weeks. Any vandalism will be reported to the Police for further action.

We urgently need a couple more volunteers for the mowing of the lawns, as a couple of people have moved out of the estate or their situation has changed. All equipment and fuel is supplied, it would only be a couple of times a year, maybe less if we can get a couple more volunteers. Please call Dianne to discuss.

Our AGM is on Sunday 16th July; due to changes in situations of a couple of the committee members, we need residents to put their hands up to join our happy group. It is not time consuming, we would love to have some younger members of the community on our committee, please consider. No more than two hours a month is required from committee members.

We are in discussions with the Gingin Shire about the cracked entrance wall and the rickety walk path at Sovereign House, we will keep you informed of our progress.

Bush medicine workshop causes a stir

Using WA's wondrous variety of native plants for wellbeing and treating ailments has long been the norm for Aboriginal Noongars. Some of this vast and interesting knowledge was passed on to the community by Viv Hansen who presented to a packed out workshop in Guilderton on Friday 10th March. Viv, a Noongar woman of the Balladong and Wadjuk people has always had an interest in traditional medicinal uses of the bush and recently received a formal qualification in Bush and Western Herbal Medicine in 2008. Rachel Walmsley, Moore Catchment Council's Community Landcare Coordinator who organised the workshop said "The interest in this workshop was overwhelming and I had to turn away at least a dozen people as we just didn't have room. When I phoned Viv to tell her the numbers, she was flabbergasted that there was so much interest. Around 70 people attended ranging from local community to travellers from Perth, various suburbs, Mundaring and even overseas visitors. Amazing turnout !"



Viv started the day by running through a few native plants and their uses. Samples from plants such as Oldman Saltbush and Balga (Grass tree) gum were shared around to see, touch and taste. Then the hands-on session started with the furious chopping of Eucalyptus and Melaleuca leaves for the balm which involved boiling up the leaves in olive oil and then adding beeswax and cooling. The balm can be used as a general moisturiser and for tired muscles. Rachel said "Next the group made herbal potpourri using various plants which can help respiratory and sleep issues. Viv also enlisted an army of stirrers to make the Eucalyptus and native lemon grass cream which involved plants steeped in water, then combined with wax and glycerine, and stirred furiously until cooled."



Viv has recently co-published a bush medicine book 'Noongar Bush Medicine: Medicinal Plants of the South-west of Western Australia' which she had for sale. Further

The day came to an end and people left armed with a new appreciation of the WA bush and samples of the creations. Rachel said "Many thanks to everyone who came along and gave great feedback, to the Guilderton Country Club for their venue and catering, to Viv and Moort Hansen for their knowledge, and to the State Natural Resource Management Program and Royalties for Regions, and the Northern Agricultural Catchments Council and National Landcare Program for their funding which made this day happen. Apologies to anyone who missed out but we plan to run another one next year. Watch this space !"

Friends of Moore River Estuary

OUR RIVER NEEDS
MOORE FRIENDS

...is pleased to have commenced our second year of water quality testing of the estuary. On 9th March we tested the 5 sites from the mouth to up past Woodridge with the support of the Dept of Water, NACC and Cooky and his boat. Here he is taking a sample from bottom to top of the river (with anaconda).

We also test temperature, salinity, dissolved oxygen, turbidity, heavy metals, etc at 50cm intervals at each site.

All results go to DoW records. This time we were joined by two of Gingin Water Group's team. They usually monitor further up river and collect our results as well. All thanks to Hamish and NACC who find the grants to do this work.

The experts were particularly pleased that the sandbar had already broken this year as testing after 'first flush' is ideal.

Our next 'meter only' testing will be in May.



As well as the good news we are sorry to say that some boaties behaviour on the river is threatening not only other river users' safety, but the riverbanks as well. There is a **5 knot limit** on the whole estuary for many reasons. Speeding and skiing may be fun but it really destroys what others value in the river. Please enjoy the area respectfully.

The same goes for the damage that 4WDs are doing to the beach and river foreshore. I have attached a map of the area where 4WDs are banned. It includes all of the river foreshore and the beach south of the groyne for 2.7kms.

The whole area of foreshore and bush south of the river includes pristine excellent vegetation and important wildlife corridors. It is no place for vehicles, which are illegal on both the private land and the reserve.

Please keep your 4WD to the Wilbinga area or north of the groyne, and to the tracks wherever you are. Bush bashing these areas is not OK.

If you observe irresponsible behaviour on the river or it's banks by people in vehicles or boats, please take photos and send them to ceo@gingin.wa.gov.au

The Shire works with DPaW, DoTransport and private landholders on these issues.

The river has been lovely this summer and the bar breaks have made it more interesting. We hope you are enjoying this special place too.

COPS CORNER



G'day everyone.

With summer drawing to a close we are pleased that to date no major incidents have occurred on our roads, on the water or in our towns which we hope continues. It says to us that people are looking out for each other, their property and are doing the right thing on our roads, thank you.

That being said, over the past few weeks speeding is still very much a constant issue, recently two vehicles were caught doing 149kph and 171kph – just madness! The first driver received a fine of \$800 and a loss of 6 demerit points. The second driver lost their car for 28 days plus impound fees and a date with the Magistrate.

Excuses offered such as “I was going downhill” or “I was little over” or “my speedo is a bit out” are not likely to reduce the issuing of an infringement. Use your brakes, be a little under and check your speedo then we'll just wave as we pass you.

One of our aims is to reduce death, serious injury and carnage on our roads - we are very active and high profile in this area. Indian Ocean Drive is becoming busier with increased volume of traffic, this can be great for our towns as hopefully a good percentage are diverted in. But, increased traffic also brings out those not concerned with other road users or their passengers' welfare. Perth Traffic also conduct regular patrols along Indian Ocean Drive to combat dangerous and stupid road behaviour.

All locals should now be aware of the change of speed zone on Indian Ocean Drive from KW Road to just North of Lancelin Road. The zone is now 90kph from 110kph and well signed so please adhere to the allocated speed.

It's great to see visitors enjoying our piece of paradise. Unsafe overtaking is another issue which still plagues us. If you need to go 130+ km/h to get around a car, then it is not safe. Overtaking around bends is not safe. Please remain patient, and use the overtaking lanes. We always want to hear about poor driving behaviour.

New legislation is now in effect which gives Police the power to impound any unlicensed motorcycle ridden on a road. Not only will offenders be charged with the offence of driving an unlicensed vehicle, they will also be liable to all storage expenses incurred. Please just walk it on/across the road.

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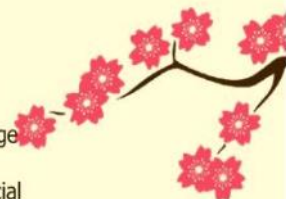

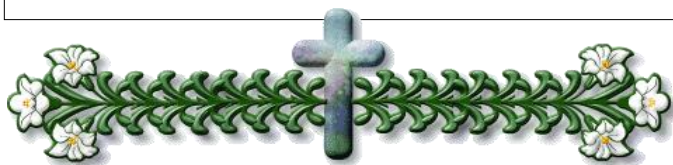
