

We are a small group of ladies who meet on the first and third Friday of the month. Many sorts of craft are done and we are happy to help anyone get started on a project.



Elevated Bacterial Warning for Moore River in Guilderton

The Shire of Gingin and the Department of Health are warning people to avoid swimming and other full-body water immersion activities in Moore River at Guilderton after recent sampling results detected amoeba and high bacteria levels at

several sampling locations.

Secondary contact activities such as kayaking and boating are currently not impacted by this warning.

Elevated bacterial levels have the potential to increase the risk of people experiencing gastrointestinal, respiratory, and skin, ear, eye and throat illnesses and infections if people swim in or accidently ingest the water.

Anyone who has entered these waters and experiencing symptoms including nausea, vomiting, diarrhoea, abdominal, chest pain etc, should seek medical attention and notify the Department of Health's Environmental Health Directorate on 9222 2000 (during office hours) or email: ehinfo@health.wa.gov.au.

We hope to bring you an answer next month.

Her choices were travel to Moora, or one hour once a month in Lancelin. Clearly either option was unacceptable. Hopefully you've all been very busy in the garden over the holidays and are ready for another big year.



Veges to plant in February:

Dwarf beans, beetroot, broccoli, brussels sprouts, cabbage, carrots, cauliflowers, celery, chicory, Chinese cabbages, cress, endive, herbs, kohlrabi, leeks, lettuces, mustard, spring onions, parsnips, peas, potatoes, radishes, rhubarb, salsify, shallots, silverbeet, spinach, swedes, turnips. If it's a hot February, remember to keep the water up to them and checks on them daily to manage pests, disease, and weeds. Keep an eye out for powdery mildew (white looking mould on the surface of the leaf), rust, and black spot. Treat with recommended fungal treatments from your nursery or garden centre. Nurseries employ horticulturists with a broad knowledge and are generally happy to help with useful advice. Lawns,

Keep up the water. One long water is better than lots of short ones. Long watering encourages the roots to chase the water down, helping to avoid drying out during a hot spell. Apply a wetting agent early in the month. Keep up the regular mowing, longer length for buffalo, a little shorter for Kikuyu and you can go even shorter for couch.


Other tasks for February:

Prune rambling roses after flowering, deadhead flowers as they fade, layer pinks, rhododendrons, and clematis, lift and dry onions, and cut dry herbs to store. Feed and water patio, hanging, and container plants. Prop up heavily laden fruit tree branches, including tomato plants, stone fruit and berries that have finished fruiting. Hopefully **pome** trees are on schedule this year and you'll start to harvest in late February. Complete Summer pruning of wisteria. If you've the time to start getting ahead start planting Spring flowering bulbs and plant a few every two weeks for a continuous showing. Divide perennials late in the month and start prepping any ground for making new lawns. Harvest herbs and store some dry, making pesto with fresh for future use. Propagate roses. Azaleas, hibiscus, fuchsias, lavender, box, buddleia and bottlebrushes. Keep your water features topped up for the wildlife to bath and feed in. Spend time in the early evening and watch the birds and wildlife come in. You might be surprised what comes in for a feed or bath. Keep it up daily for the wildlife to see it as a regular source.

ast December, just days before Christmas (2021) at the age of 63, my life & my family's lives changed forever with the diagnosis that one in six Aussie men will have in their lifetimes.....I have high-risk prostate cancer which means treatments may not cure the cancer but will hopefully give me more quality time!

Unfortunately, my diagnosis was later than ideal & during an open radical prostatectomy early last February, it was discovered that the cancer had spread to the pelvic lymph nodes, so 13 were removed, of which, 5 lymph nodes had cancer. My Gleason score was 9 which means it's at the upper end for severity....less than ideal! Unfortunately, I have an aggressive form of the cancer which was fast in developing.

My post operative PSA level was still 4.0, down from the 25 which set the alarm bells ringing last December. I consulted an oncologist & a treatment plan was set in place which involved starting me on hormone therapy to hopefully shrink the microscopic cancer tissues remaining after surgery. Following another PSA test (simple blood test) my PSA had dropped to 0.2, my oncologist decided this was the ideal time to undergo a course of radiation treatments targeting the bed of the removed prostate & the area where the lymph nodes had been removed. This entailed 33 daily treatments, each lasting around 3 minutes over a 7 week period Monday to Friday. Exercise is encouraged while undergoing radiation treatments & I decided to try to continue my daily walk of 6km & cycling up to 30km on my EMTB (e-mountain bike). Fortunately, I managed to remain active physically & during radiation treatment I decided to join Prostate Cancer Foundation Australia to help raise awareness of this common cancer that is taking the lives of more Aussie men than breast cancer takes the lives of women. It's not a statistic either sex wants so it's time we as a nation got serious about education about prostate cancer. One of the sad facts is that PSA testing guidelines are so far out of date but PCFA has lobbied federal government & a review into these guidelines is soon to be a reality.

Currently, to receive a PSA test, men need to be aged between 50 & 75 years.

If prostate cancer is present in families,



During my radiation treatment in a moment of madness or maybe geniousness, I committed to riding my EMTB from the eastern end of the Gibb River Road located between Wyndham & Kununurra to the western end near Derby, to help raise awareness of Prostate Cancer. I have a fundraising campaign operating through PCFA to raise funds for research & support for men going through tough times with this cancer. You can read about my diagnosis, treatment & plans to solo ride the GRR at https://fundraise.pcfa.org.au/s/1209/1259

Donations over \$2 are tax deductible. I will be commencing my ride early May 2023 & plan to visit most of the campgrounds to speak about my experience with prostate cancer & hopefully encourage more men to be proactive about having a PSA blood test EVERY year! You can follow my ride using the above link as I will be updating it as often as possible.

My recent PSA test last month showed PSA was 0.01, pretty much undetectable & hopefully it will remain low when I stop hormone treatment in May 2023.....

Wishing everyone seasons greetings & a healthy 2023. Reminder for every bloke out there who is over 45/50, please have your PSA test EVERY year without fail, it may just save your life! Its just a simple blood test which takes a couple of minutes!



All you have to do is phone the above number after 8am and before 8pm and register. You need your Medicare card handy. You will then after the normal load of questions, be given a registration number which you use when you click on My Aged Care in MyGov!

I have been chatting to various residents in this area and this is the first step you have to take to get any help as you age. Once you feel you may need help you see your GP. The process if needed, is that Aged Care will send a person to your home to assess you and your house etc. They then decide how much help you will be offered.


